#### FINANCIAL PERFORMANCE

Investment performance is an essential part of how we steward your gifts and plan for their future. We feel it is important to share our plans and our financial performance with you.

On March 31, 2019 the value of the endowment was \$9.9 million. The fund's 1-year and 3-year actual returns were 4.95% and 5.06% respectively which are above our long-term return goal of 4.5%, exceeding returns since inception. This is attributed to the market recoveries in the equity and bond markets.

Our investment policy is aimed at preserving capital, maintaining liquidity necessary to meet cash requirements and maximize the return within acceptable risk levels. As the university's foundation matures and the funds grow, the university will continue to take advantage of market opportunities while still maintaining an ethical ethos and managing risks.

# **Serious Science**

FACULTY AND STAFF CREATE THE NOBLE SCHOOL LAB VISIT FUND

About twenty kindergartners are hard at work. The small scientists create solutions with the vortex mixer, observe pond water with the microscope and carefully pour colourful liquids from test tubes to beakers. Mickie Noble stands in the middle of the action, clad in a tie-dyed lab coat and a delighted expression. This is the eighteenth year Noble, an assistant professor in School of Environment and Sustainability, has opened her lab to elementary students from Greater Victoria to show them the wonders of hands-on science.

"We give kids a chance to experience what science is and what scientists do," says Noble. "It's about helping kids look at science and think, 'You know what? I could do that. That would be really cool to do when I grow up.'"

Teacher Jeni-Lynn Blackie moves between the students. "I waited four years for this opportunity to bring my kindergartners to the Royal Roads lab," Blackie says. "I can't bring all this to my classroom, but they can experience it here."

The program is free to schools. Funding came from various areas of the university over the years but was never guaranteed. Now the lab visits will continue well into the future thanks to faculty and staff from the School of Environment and Sustainability who support the fund with payroll deductions.
