Strong links between Taiwan & Royal Roads.

TAIWAN ALUMNI ASSOCIATION HAS MUCH TO CELEBRATE, INCLUDING A 10TH ANNIVERSARY.

Royal Roads University has built a reputation for attracting students from around the world, with learners travellingor studying remotely, both before and during the COVID-19 pandemic-from afar.

It might surprise some to learn that among the top three sources of foreign students at the university is Taiwan, an island of just 36,000 square kilometres-for reference, Vancouver Island is 31,000 sq. km-and 23.6 million people. And just as Taiwan punches above its weight in representation among the Royal Roads student body, its alumni have an outsize loyalty to the school where they studied even though they did not attend class at the Victoria, BC campus but in a specialized program hosted at a local university.

Nowhere is that loyalty expressed more earnestly than in the Taiwan Alumni Association, which on Dec. 12 celebrated its 10th anniversary.



When this photo was taken Taiwan had gone 200 days without a locally transmitted Covid-19 case. At press, Taiwan has had only 917 cases and eight deaths since the beginning of the pandemic.

TAA was founded in 2010 by three passionate alumni: Walter Chu, Bright Lin and C.F. Tsai. To this day, it is one of the largest Master of Business Administration alumni associations in Taiwan, with 1,800 alumni and close to 500 Royal Roads grads who are regularly involved, says Lin, the group's chair. Since its founding, TAA members have supported Royal Roads students by creating a number of awards. In 2015 former Chair Madame J.M. Chang established the RRU Royal Scholarship to promote intercultural experiences.

The goal of the association, which is registered with and formally recognized by the Taiwan government, is for its members to network and to contribute to their communities, says Lin, 66.

The ties between the association and Royal Roads remains strong, with the group even hosting a global alumni summit in 2014. Post-pandemic, RRU leaders hope to travel to Taiwan to reconnect with Lin and other TAA members. In the meantime, Lin said the Taiwan Alumni Association is aiming to network with other Royal Roads University alumni associations around the world to establish new relationships, connect online and, one day, meet in person.

AWARD RECIPIENT: ERIN OLDMAN

Paying it forward, around the world.

The first recipient of the Victoria Foundation Rachel and Ernest Fox Legacy Award.

Just before Christmas in 2016, Erin Oldman's doctor advised her to take a break.

She'd spent most of the previous decade working as a safety officer and volunteering for organizations supporting mental health.

Ironically, the work had taken a toll on Oldman's own health. Diagnosed with chronic stress, she took a trip to Bali.

"When the time came to board the flight home on Christmas Eve, however, I found myself reluctant to do so," says Oldman. "I decided to forfeit the airline ticket and go back to the beach where I had spent much of the previous week."

That decision changed her life.

On Christmas Day, she met Prof. Ken Christie, with the School of Humanitarian Studies at Royal Roads University. Christie suggested Oldman pursue a Master of Arts degree in Human Security and Peacebuilding at Royal Roads.

"I protested strongly this was a very long shot, considering I had barely attained a high school certification," says Oldman. "Ken was persistent, and his confidence sparked something inside me that would refuse to be extinguished."

Oldman completed her degree in 2020 and became the first recipient of the \$25,000 Victoria Foundation Rachel and Ernest Fox Legacy Award.

The Foxes left their estate to the Victoria Foundation to support a fund offering loans to post-secondary students. While it was an exciting opportunity, it also created a challenge, according to Sara Neely, the foundation's director of philanthropic services.

"We wanted to honour the Foxes' wishes but managing that type of fund, where money gets repaid, wasn't something we had experience with," says Neely.



In 2009, the Foundation and Royal Roads established the Rachel and Ernest Fox Loan program, the first of its kind in Canada. That same fund has made the new Victoria Foundation Rachel and Ernest Fox Legacy Award possible–and opened up new possibilities for Oldman. The award is designated for students at Royal Roads who demonstrate the capacity to make a profound change in society.

Oldman is using most of her award to establish a charity called International Humanitarian Assessments, helping people in war-torn Syria, and she has no doubt she made the right decision on that beach.

"It seemed that fate was offering me an incredible and rare opportunity," Oldman says. "I've already invested in learning how to be of greater help to others. With this financial bequest in hand, now is the time to invest in others to do the same."

Rachel and Ernest Fox would no doubt agree.
